It is the responsibility of the Vestry Chairperson to present to the AGM a report on the steps which have been taken in pursuance of our charitable objects during the financial year which is under review.

Those objects are:

- a) the advancement of the Christian faith in Edinburgh and also throughout Scotland and the rest of the world, by all means consistent with the teachings of the Bible including worship, ministry, prayer, evangelism, education, service to the community and the support of agencies, individuals and other charitable organisations involved in Christian ministry, mission and service;
- b) the advancement of community development; and
- c) the relief of those in need.

We appreciate the contributions of those who preach and those who contribute in so many ways. I started to list them but the list became too long. The reports from all ministries are available and we appreciate all that is being done. The point is that the work of St Thomas' has continued without interruption.

VESTRY SUB-COMMITTEES

Finance Group

The responsibilities of the Finance Group are as follows:.

Agnes Murray – Church Treasurer, does all presentations, AGMs, attends vestry meetings. Prepares the annual budget, prepares the annual accounts in statutory format and liaises with our auditors.

Miller Bogie now reviews the draft accounts before they are passed to the auditor. The treasurer prepares monthly management accounts and pays all invoices and expense claims.

The World Day of Prayer service was held on the 1st March 2019 at St Ninian's Church. The title was "Come All Is Ready" and was based on the invitation by God to come to his feast as written in Luke 14:15 - 24. The service was written by the Christian women of Slovenia. The preacher was the Reverend Andy Scarcliff a retired Baptist minister who emphasised that just as the servants in the story were sent out to the highways and byways to invite the people to the feast, so the church needs to reach out to the people outside its walls.

The last few years have been overshadowed by the question of our relationship with the SEC. That is now resolved. We now have Episcopal guidance from Bishop Andy Lines and we are grateful to him for his wisdom and his support. We are contributing to the cost of his ministry and we encourage all members to support him in prayer. We are operating independently, under a new constitution. Some people have remarked on its length and the detailed procedures it specifies but it should be understood that it was necessary to provide not only a replacement for the congregational constitution but also for the SEC Code of Canons which previously applied to us and which made much more detailed provision at very much greater length and which prescribed procedures which were much less transparent. Our new constitution is informing work on similar documents in several other churches.

We are heavily involved in planning just now. We have the Great Commission to fulfil and we have a mission field on our doorstep which is large and which will increase when the new houses are built at Cammo. We want to find the best ways we can to share the Gospel with the people who live, and who will come to live, in our area. We are looking at our presentation (branding, website), at how to build social capital so that people find St Thomas' an attractive organisation and at how we might use all of our resources to make disciples. We are very conscious of the need to look outwards and not to become self absorbed and inward looking.

We are conscious, too, of the strong support we have received from other churches, in Scotland through the Scottish Anglican Network and globally from churches linked through the GAFCON network. We are very grateful for that support and we are active in maintaining those links. We need other Christians, other churches. GAFCON represents about 80% of all Anglicans in the world and there are significant differences in practice amongst its members. GAFCON makes no attempt to be prescriptive about those differences. But what holds them and us together is the belief

that the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God written and contain all things necessary for salvation; and the affirmation that the Bible is to be translated, read, preached, taught and obeyed in its plain and canonical sense, respectful of the church's historic and consensual reading. That is immutable and we will move forward, in the coming year, on that basis.

Finally, we record our deep appreciation of the commitment and the work of our Rector, David. He works faithfully and tirelessly on our behalf, often at considerable personal cost to himself and to Ali. We are blessed to have him. We should support him in every way we can.

Prayer Support

The purpose of prayer ministry is to offer time and space for the congregation in St T's to actively bring their concerns, requests and thanks to God. People may share needs for themselves and others, both within and outside the church family. In this way, the prayer team aim to 'carry each other's burdens' and so 'fulfil the law of Christ' Gal 6:2. We are made aware of individual prayer needs in many different ways: people come after the service or during communion to the small circle of chairs on the left at the front of the church; through our conversations with people at coffee time; through the Rector and others alerting the group to particular needs during the week. The details of the prayer request will be kept confidential within the prayer team or, if requested, kept confidential only to those of the team who prayed with the individual initially.

We will pray continually over weeks and months if necessary, and we try to follow up by sensitively asking the person how they are doing. We also 'rejoice with those who rejoice' and enjoy thanking God together when individuals tell us of God's goodness, especially when he answers our prayers. The list of team members is on the notice board at the back of church, and this year Kerstin Prill joined the team . By the end of 2019, there were 8 members in the prayer ministry. As two people are allocated each Sunday, this means we can offer prayer support on 1^{st} , 2^{nd} ,

regularly. All families with school age children are welcome to come along and join us.

Homegroups

We have five home groups/small groups which meet on varying nights of the week. The groups are identified by geographical area, but membership of each group is not defined by where people live.

Some meet weekly and others fortnightly for study, prayer, mutual support and fellowship. Leaders meet regularly with the Rector to coordinate the studies and to inform him of the needs of any group member. Bible studies are linked to the sermon series on Sunday mornings and sometimes to the monthly church central meeting.

This years studies have been from 2 Corinthians 'Sing' and Colossians. Group members take responsibility for mutual support particularly when individuals are unwell or infirm. Social events, especially meals together, enable people to get to know one another better and to integrate new members. Around 50% of church members belong to a home group. Bible Reading Notes

A wide range of publications for Bible reading, suitable for all ages, is published by Scripture union, CWR and the Good Book Company. We would like to see an increasing number making use of notes to encourage

engage with the wider community by serving. I know of people who are on school parent/teacher councils, who are serving on the Community Council and who are engaged with serving the poorest in our city. Some are taking seriously the need to care for the most vulnerable in our church family. I am mindful too that those who are in work are on the frontline of actively witnessing to the love of God in Christ – that is where our faith can be experienced at its most active. Our buildings continue to be used by many different groups in the area, Guides and Brownies, and for social occasions like parties. Our own group for carers and toddlers on Tuesday mornings continues to attract parents, childminders and grandparents with their little ones. There is much in the way of social capital available to us – we should make better use of such contacts and offer God's love to those with whom we connect. We continue to visit homes with invitations at Easter and Christmas, where we have also offered to pray for any needs.

We have sought to keep the Bible at the centre of our life together. Sunday morning remains the key time in the week where we come together to listen for the Lord's voice in the preaching of His Word. We have experimented with a new monthly gathering for worship called "Embrace". This is from 4.45pm on the second Sunday of the month. Our home groups have continued to gather around the Bible on a regular basis and remain the primary place for fellowship and encouragement. "Family First" continues to draws people together for fellowship, fun and learning. We pray and learn together at the monthly "Prayer Base" and "Central" meetings.

Community-building has continued with Hospitality Sundays being re-introduced as one way to do this. We have seen some growth in the Coffee Plus gathering on Thursday mornings, especially among the number-of men attending. Recently a little "Bible Thought for the Day" and discussion/prayer was introduced. We have contemplated a church weekend away but issues of venue and cost have proved inhibiting so far.

There is much still to do. Phil Taylor's joining us in the autumn has been a tremendous help and indicates our commitment to working with young people. Yet we have few in number (what we lack in quantity we make up for in quality!). Let's pray for and work towards seeing more joining our community.

We must also seek to build a wider church community of those congregations who have sought realignment within the Anglican tradition. We are exploring a day with the other churches in our network, perhaps in the autumn. This year should see the establishment of a missionary diocese in Europe operating under the oversight of the Anglican Network in Canada. The Scottish congregations will have a leading role in its formation – please pray for wisdom as we build something together that will have the Gospel at its heart, a lightness in its organisation and an outward looking attitude.

The vestry and trustees are exploring the way ahead in terms of our vision and how we organise ourselves. Expect to see some new expressions of our mission and values as we head into the autumn. These will help fuel and keep us to account for how we build and how we live.

Thank you to all those who serve the Lord so well. I love that so many are engaged in serving in sacrificial ways. Several people have stood down from their roles this year after very long service (or are in the process of doing so). For example, Rob Hyder is stepping down from organising our wardens and Rosemary Kemp stood down from the flower ministry. We can only be grateful for their faithful service. Our treasurer, Agnes Murray will also be standing down this year. She has been an exceptionally faithful overseer and I am personally very grateful for the way she has conducted our finances.

This reminds us that gaps open up when people stand down. These roles are vital and must be filled in order to build the body of Christ. I am most aware of this in relation to vestry membership. Several vestry members will

Our motto is Keep calm and put Family First - and that is what we strive to do. We've welcomed new families this year and said farewell to old friends - but although the faces attending our group this year might have changed, our vision certainly hasn't. We still strive to provide a space in the church calendar which provides a place where families can meet together, share together, worship together, pray for one another and eat together! We have continued to meet monthly throughout the year providing a forum for coffee and chat for the adults; whilst the children are engaged in a craft activity linked to the theme of our evening; this is followed by an all age style talk and family prayer time; then games finishing with a meal together offering more time for fellowship.

Flower Ministry

The **Flower team** decorates the church at Christmas, Easter and Harvest, and makes up posies of daffodils which are distributed on Mothering Sunday. Individual members also arrange flowers, as required, which have been donated by members of the congregation for other Sundays.

After each Sunday morning service members of the **flower distribution team** dismantle the arrangements. They gift the flowers to individuals as a thank you, or as a remembrance on a special birthday or anniversary or other celebration, give them to any who are unwell or who have suffered a bereavement, or take them to members who are housebound or in nursing homes and no longer able to come to church. The flowers are much appreciated by those who receive them.

Members of the congregation (or home groups ...) are encouraged to sign up to donate and arrange flowers for a particular Sunday, or to donate money for flowers which will then be arranged by a member of the flower team.

They are also encouraged to make suggestions of particular recipients for the flowers on any Sunday.

Both flower teams would love to have additional members. Please speak to any member of either team if you are able to help in one or both teams, or if you wish to discuss more about what volunteering with them might involve.

Nursing Home Ministry - Manor Grange Nursing Home, Pinkhill

We are grateful to God for many encouragements this year as we have sought to provide a monthly Service of Christian worship with a Gospel message to some of the 80+ residents and staff at the Manor Grange Care Home. This serves to reconnect people with a wider Christian community, and to remind them of God's unfailing love and faithfulness throughout their lives, especially at times of loss or amidst major changes of circumstance. Quite a number of the 14 or so who attend Services have a real faith and longstanding church connections.

Two of their Activities Coordinators in particular (Lorna and Maureen) have been very supportive of this ministry, and Lorna brings some of the more mobile residents to Coffee Plus one Thursday each month and it has been good to chat with them. Our speakers have included Sandy Benzies, Bill Mc Gillivray, Bruce Gordon, Christine Macdonald, Ian Young and Revd. Stan Brook, all of whom have given excellent short messages. Linda Aslet kindly plays the piano at our special Services (e.g. Christmas or Easter). Most Services are held on Tuesday or Thursday afternoons in the fourth week of each month.

26 people, including some relatives and staff, attended the Care Home Carol Service, a joyful occasion at which Stan Brook reminisced over life as it was in Scotland 70 years ago and helped us reflect on the living Saviour who still comes among us with life-transforming power today. We know of at least 4 members of the Manor Grange staff who are committed Christians. Please join us in praying for their work and witness to colleagues and residents in the Home.

One dear Christian lady 'Sally' died shortly after Christmas – the same lady to whom we had given an Easy-Read Bible one year previously and such was the family's appreciation of our ministry to this resident that they asked us whether we might conduct Sally's funeral. As she came from South

Queensferry, Canon Mike Parker kindly obliged, with Mark contributing an Appreciation of this lady as we celebrated her long and well-lived life.

Again this year we were invited to run a Craft Stall at the Home's pre-Christmas Fair. This was fairly well attended and the sale of many beautifully, hand-made articles raised a total of £280 for Bethany Christian Fellowship – well done all our crafty ladies at Coffee Plus. The possibility of some form of Pastoral Care or Chaplaincy is also under consideration by Care Home Management.

CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

Protection of Vulnerable Groups (Adults and Children)

The PVG group currently consists of Margaret Robertson, Sheila Nicol and Linda Henderson. Margaret keeps a watching brief on issues relating to older, vulnerable people. Linda takes responsibility for the Lighthouse monitoring role to ensure adequate child/volunteer ratio and undertakes any admin required. All volunteers working with adults, children and young people at St Thomas's are checked under the PVG scheme and currently Sheila is responsible for obtaining these. We are now using Volunteer Scotland as the organisation through which we apply for PVGs. We remain committed to maintaining policies and procedures to help protect vulnerable members of our church community and we are in the process of registering with the Christian organisation "thirtyone:eight" who will give support in all areas of safeguarding.

The group meets 3 or 4 times a year and we are always available to offer

Our Wardens and Stewards provide a most important ministry within the church's life. There are 8 teams of Wardens and Stewards who fulfil a vital role to ensure the reputation continues of St Thomas' as a friendly and welcoming church – if done well, as it almost always is, they may not be noticed but if very occasionally it's done badly, it can be obvious. In all 40 different people are required and are involved on an 8 week rota basis to provide this service. More volunteers would be greatly appreciated to ensure continuity and support for the clergy and groups taking part in church services. I have stepped down now from organising this particular contribution to the Sunday services and would like to take this opportunity to thank the many people who have assisted over the years. Inevitably replacements become necessary as existing stewards move away or retire, so if you would like to assist in the future please contact the church office.

Coffee Plus

Once again Coffee Plus has had another good year. We are thankful to the Lord for increased numbers and the thriving men's group. In October, Coffee Plus organised the Blythswood Shoebox appeal for St. Thomas' and approximately 60 boxes were given. Mums and Toddlers

Rainbows

Our Rainbows unit is full with a group of 5 and 6 year olds who are very enthusiastic, even on a cold wet evening. They are delighted to have an additional qualified leader. Highlight of the year was a visit to an amateur panto performance where the girls enjoyed shouting and responding to the performers.

Messy crafts and noisy games continue to be extremely popular, whilst the girls look forward to lighter evenings that will allow them to enjoy more outdoor fun.

Brownies

Brownies also have a full unit, but have been able to accommodate girls progressing from Rainbows without the need for a waiting list. Regular leaders Grace Donald and Catherine McGuire are supported by a group of young leaders, all of whom are likely to move on at the summer as they take up university places. Fiona Campbell has shared her crafting skills and Gladys Bennett has provided additional help, and the McGuire family has provided considerable practical help. However, more adult help, especially on a regular and weekly basis, is required.

Highlights of the past year have included engaging with Comic Relief, taking part in a drama workshop, and learning the country and people of China as part of an international theme. Discovering about butterflies and going up Corstorphine Hill on a nature walk stimulated excitement about the outdoors. Similarly, going outside to observe the stars in the night sky linked with a focus and enthusiasm for learning about space. Last summer's outing was an afternoon spent visiting the Guides at camp and taking part in a range of activities with them.

Guides are down in numbers this year, older girls having moved on at the summer. A small but enthusiastic group meet each Friday evening. Recent activities have centred round baking and crafts, the smaller group size facilitating the learning of new skills. Themed evenings have considered 'new' things and eco friendly habits, Scottish culture, and an international focus. Time has also been spent on learning emergency and first aid skills. Before the summer many opportunities were taken to explore aspects of the outdoors, the highlight of the year being our weekend camp at Carsewell, near Penicuik, where we pitched and slept in tents and cooked and ate in the open air, and took part in activities based round the theme of Space. In November we went to the King's Theatre to watch the 50th anniversary Scout and Guide Gang Show in which two of our group were performing.

Rainbows, Brownies and Guides continue to be encouraged by the numbers of girls who belong. The majority of members come from the local area, many with no other church connection. A particular challenge is how to encourage the girls and their families to link with other activities in church.

We are very grateful for the interest and support, practically and in prayer, from many at St Thomas's – and would love to speak with any who might be interested in future involvement and leadership, even on a part time basis, and especially with Brownies.
